La Madre de los Gatos

Brian Beck (b. 1976)

La Madre de los Gatos ("The Mother of the Cats") refers to the nickname given to Mrs. Verda Shine, also known as Mamma Kitty, by her colleagues at Bryd Middle School in Duncanville, Texas. Along with her fondness for cats, Shone earned her nickname for her commitment to the nurturing and support of both staff and students. The piece was written to celebrate her zeal and dedicate service as a Duncanville band director, and it was first performed at the 2009 Duncanville band concert.

As the Spanish language suggests, this composition reflects a Spanish style of music, the *paso doble*. All of the expected musical conventions are present, including fanfare gestures, Spanish style melodies and a dramatic accelerando at the end.

The Cave You Fear

Michael Markowski (b. 1986)

"The Cave You Fear to enter holds the treasure you seek." - Joseph Campbell

I've been thinking a lot lately about all the opportunities we're given day to day to try something new or to go somewhere we've never been before—the opportunity to take a spontaneous road trip, to go see a concert by a band we've never heard of at a venue we've never been to, to try that new restaurant down the street where the menu is in a language we don't quite understand. Some people have an innate sense of adventure, who go with the flow, who live life for the unexplored, and I couldn't be more inspired by them.

For a long time, I was the opposite. I used to prefer to stay at home, working on my computer because it was the safe and responsible thing to be doing, listening to the same albums on my iPod, ordering the same meal at the same, familiar restaurants. And while there's nothing necessarily wrong with having a

routine or knowing what you like, I eventually realized that my life was starting to have a certain predictability to it. It was a few years ago, while I was still living in the same state that I was born and raised in, that I had the most terrifying epiphany that I think I've ever had. I was becoming increasingly bored and incredibly boring.

In film schools around the world, Joseph Campbell's book *The Hero With A Thousand Faces* is required reading for filmmakers, screenwriters and storytellers because Campbell has single-handedly identified what we refer to as "The Hero's Journey"—the series of events and conflicts that arise along a character's path as he or she fights their way to some ultimate goal. After studying Campbell, it's easy to question where we are on our own paths. What is our own story? What are we fighting for? What does it mean to be a "hero" and how can we be more "heroic" ourselves? When we hear our own call to adventure, will we jump up, prepared, or will we ignore it, sit idly and take the easy way out because we would rather life be quiet and comfortable? According to Campbell, each of our adventures are already out there, waiting for us. That's not the problem. For him, "the big question is whether you are going to be able to say a hearty "yes" to your adventure.

So for the next four minutes, let's take a chance, let's venture into the dark unknown, let's fight whatever monsters we find in there. And although we might not always prevail, at least we'll have a story to tell by the end.

In the Hall of the Mountain King

Edvard Grieg (1843-1907)

arr. Robert W. Smith and Michael Story

In the Hall of the Mountain King (Norwegian: I Dovregubbens hall) is a piece by Edvard Grieg, originally for orchestra, for the sixth scene of act 2 in Henrik Ibsen's 1876 play Peer Gynt. It was originally part of Opus 23 but was later extracted as the final piece of Peer Gynt, Suite No. 1, Op. 46. Its easily recognizable theme has helped it attain iconic status in popular culture, where it has been arranged by many artists. In the play, Dovregubben is a troll king that Peer Gynt invents in a fantasy.

Loch Lomond

Frank Ticheli (b. 1958)

Ticheli's setting of the famous folksong is simple yet charming, preserving faithfully the melody and adding interesting harmonic vocabulary. Loch Lomond tells the tale of two Scottish soldiers who were imprisoned at Carlisle Castle in England following the Battle of Culloden Moor. One of the soldiers was to be executed, while the other was to be set free. According to Celtic legend, those who died in foreign lands had their spirits travel to their homelands through the "low road," the route for the souls of the departed. The song is from the point of view of the soldier to be executed, who tells his friend "ye'll tak' the high road and I'll tak' the low road," in effect saying that the freed soldier will return alive, while he himself would return in spirit. He remembers his past and the "bonnie lass" (pretty girl) he will never see again, and sadly accepts death.

Using a variety of musical effects and techniques, *Operation Super Sleuth* has captured the excitement and feel of the spy-themed music of the 60s and 70s. Written in the very playable key of C minor, nearly every section in the band gets in on the fun as musicians/secret agents take on the latest mission of espionage and intrigue. Composer Christina Huss has included a variety of familiar spy sounding thematic material to make this journey a fun, exciting one. There are plenty of interesting percussion parts to go around.

Blue Ridge Reel

Brian Balmages (b. 1975)

Blue Ridge Reel was inspired by a recent visit to Ashville for the National Convention of the American Band Directors Association. I was extremely taken with the fun vibe of the town, located in the mountains of North Carolina. During the trip, I had an opportunity to hear several bluegrass bands, including a great performance during a dinner and special tour of the Biltmore Estate. I love the rich heritage of the music of the mountains of the Eastern United

States. Many influences in the region come from the rich cultures of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. This fiddle music eventually played a major role in the development of country and bluegrass music.

The title, *Blue Ridge Reel*, pays homage to the Blue Ridge Mountains. While influenced by the form and style of a traditional Irish reel, the music certainly heads in some contemporary directions as it seeks to mix the modern feel of a city like Ashville with its deeply engrained musical roots. It is also deeply influenced by the untimely passing of Davidson College mathematics professor Robert Whitton, a music lover and major supporter of local musicians. Shortly before his passing, more than 100 friends and family gathered in downtown Davidson to participate in a New Orleans-style march through the city. Thus, this piece ties together the spirit of that New Orleans march with my own personal bluegrass experiences in Ashville ... This marks my first time exploring this particular fusion of styles in the wind band idiom, but certainly not my last! —Program note by composer

American Hymnsong Suite

Dwayne S. Milburn (b. 1963)

American Hymnsong Suite is firmly rooted in my family history as church musicians. I grew up singing and playing many different hymns, including the four tunes featured in this work. The final impetus to compose this particular treatment came during the course of an organ concert in Atlanta, Georgia. One section of the program featured innovative settings of three hymns. With the gracious consent of composers Joe Utterback and Brooks Kukendall, I adapted their settings to act as the inner movements of the suite, bracketed with my own original treatments of favorite hymns.

The *Prelude on "Wondrous Love"* ("What Wondrous Love is This") opens with a chant-like statement of this Southern tune before proceeding to a more kinetic retelling. *Ballad on "Balm in Gilead"* features a rich jazz harmonization of this familiar spiritual. The *Scherzo on "Nettleton"* ("Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing") contains all the rhythmic playfulness inherent in the best orchestral third movements, and the *March on "Wilson"* ("When We All Get to Heaven") calls to mind the wildest marching band ever heard.

While audience members will certainly make various connections to this piece, the ongoing goal is to introduce all listeners to the richness of our American musical heritage.

Downey Overture

Oscar Navarro (b. 1981)

Downey Overture is dedicated with all my affection to the Downey Symphony Orchestra, for its hard work and dedication and, of course, to its conductor, Sharon Lavery, for her professionalism and great passion for music. Downey Overture is a Latin-American fusion with which I have wanted to link my birth country, Spain, and California, the land that, as a result of the two years I lived there, has left a permanent imprint on my heart. An amalgam of rhythm and musical color wrapped in an atmosphere of dance are the essence of this piece. It is joyful, energetic and written with all my enthusiasm and dedication. —Program note by composer

Fanfare Politeia

Kimberly Archer (b. 1973)

Fanfare Politeia is an homage to the origins of our democracy, and to the ancient sources that Madison, Hamilton, Jefferson and Adams drew from in their conceiving and writing our Constitution. Politeia is a Greek word derived from polis ("city"). Aristotle used the term to represent concepts such as citizens' rights and constitutional government, while Plato's examination of justice – a book which we now call *The Republic*, in English—was actually entitled *Politeia* in the original Greek.

Commissioned by "The President's Own" United States Marine Band for the 59th Presidential Inauguration, *Fanfare Politeia* celebrates our traditions of a free and fair election, and of a peaceful transfer of power.

March of the Trolls

Edvard Grieg (1843-1907)

March of the Trolls is from Edvard Grieg's Lyric Pieces, Op. 54. Trolls are a constant theme in Norwegian folklore and can be viewed as the equivalent of our "boogie man." Far to the north in Norway where the winter storms whip the weather-beaten coasts, you will find dark forests with moonlit lakes, deep fjords surrounded by mighty snow capped mountains, and long rivers and cold streams cascading down the mountain sides. This is where you might find the irritable, short-tempered trolls coming out of their hiding places after sunset, marching to wreck havoc on unsuspecting Norwegian households.

Three Chorale Preludes

William P. Latham (1917-2004)

Three Chorale Preludes, although written in the early 18th-century style and based on familiar chorale melodies, are not arrangements of any existing chorale preludes. They are original compositions for band. They are based on:

1. Ermunter Dich, Mein Schwacher Geist ("Break Forth, O Beauteous Heavenly Light"). The text is from a Christmas hymn by Johann Rist. The tune is by Johann Schop. It was first published in Rist's *Himmlische Lieder*, 1641. The tune has been used by many composers, including J.S. Bach in his Christmas Oratorio.

Dominic Talanca

Conductor, Middle School Honor Band

Dominic Talanca is director of bands and associate professor of music at the University of North Carolina Wilmington. Talanca conducts the Symphonic Band and Pep Band, teaches courses in conducting and woodwind techniques, and administers all aspects of the band program. He is also the conductor of the Wilmington Symphonic Winds, Wilmington Symphony Pops Orchestra, Wilmington Chamber Orchestra and the OLLI New Horizons Band.

Talanca received a Bachelor of Music Education and Master of Music in wind conducting from the University of North Texas, where he studied conducting with Eugene Migliaro Corporon. He received a Doctor of Musical Arts in wind Conducting at Northwestern University, where he studied with Mallory Thompson.

Talanca taught for 10 years in the Lewisville Independent School District in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex and served as the associate director of bands at Marcus High School in Flower Mound, Texas from 2006-2013, during which time the student musicians were recognized for their performances in concert and marching activities—earning numerous placements in the All-Region and All-State ensembles as well as four consecutive biannual Texas 5A State Marching Championship Awards.

Talanca co-authored a beginning band method, *Musical Mastery*, published by MRNS Music. The text is used in 140+ school districts (more than 400 schools) in Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Wisconsin and

internationally (e.g., Japan and Oman)—impacting an estimated 100,000+ students to date. Several universities have also adopted the book as the primary text for their instrumental methods classes.

Additionally, Talanca has contributed three chapters to GIA publication *Teaching Music Through Performance in Band* series in addition to published journal articles for the music education journals in North Carolina, Utah and Arkansas, and an article in the WASBE Journal. He has presented multiple times at The Midwest Clinic International Band and Orchestra Conference in Chicago and numerous other music education conferences in North Carolina, Texas and Utah.

Talanca has recorded more than 450 significant works in the wind band repertoire on the Mark Custom, Klavier, Naxos, and GIA recording labels. He has also had the privilege to conduct as well as perform and record with the Lone Star Wind Orchestra.

Talanca is an active conductor, clinician and adjudicator. In recent years, he has been invited to guest conduct ensembles throughout North Carolina and across the country, regularly engaging with thousands of secondary school students each year. His professional affiliations include Pi Kappa Lambda (National Music Honor Society), the College Band Directors National Association, North Carolina Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, and he is an honorary member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.

Mary K. Schneider

Conductor, High School Honor Band

Mary K. Schneider is professor of conducting and director of bands at Eastern Michigan University where she conducts the EMU Wind Symphony, teaches graduate and undergraduate courses in conducting and music education, and oversees the comprehensive university bands program. Prior to this appointment, Schneider held a teaching position at the University of Minnesota School of Music and had a successful career as a secondary school instrumental music educator.

Active nationally and internationally as a guest conductor and clinician, Schneider has served as an adjudicator for the Music For All National Concert Band Festival, the Thailand International Wind Symphony Competition and the Illinois SuperState Concert Band Festival. She served as clinician and chief adjudicator for the Victorian School Music Festival in Melbourne, Australia, and featured instructor of the ABODA Conducting Symposium in Sydney, New South Wales. Schneider has been an invited guest conductor of the U.S. Air Force Band, Dallas Winds, Sydney Conservatorium of Music Wind Symphony, Concordia Santa Fe, Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp Festival & Staff Bands and Wheaton Municipal Band, and is a frequent guest conductor of regional and All-State honor bands throughout the United States.

Elected to the prestigious American Bandmasters Association in 2013, Schneider served as president of the North Central Division of the College Band Directors National Association from 2021-2023—the first woman elected to leadership since the inception of the division—and currently serves on the Music Education Committee of CBDNA. A strong advocate for new wind music, she has participated in commissioning and/or premiering over three dozen works for wind band, and her ensembles frequently collaborate with a diverse group of composers. In addition to published articles in the GIA book series, *Teaching Music Through Performance in Band*, she has presented on the topic of wind band repertoire at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago and is a frequent invited lecturer on the celebrated American composer, John Corigliano, and his Symphony No. 3 for large wind ensemble, "Circus Maximus."

Schneider holds a doctoral degree in conducting from the University of Texas at Austin, and degrees in horn performance and music education from the New England Conservatory of Music and University of Connecticut, having graduated with Distinction in Performance honors from the former. She is a member of MSBOA, Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma, and serves as Michigan Chair for the National Band Association.

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


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
