# **Christina Lalog Seal**

Praised for her "effortless" playing and "admirable improvisations," pianist Christina Lalog Seal completed a Doctor of Musical Arts at the University of Colorado Boulder specializing in collaborative piano (Daily Camera, Boulder). While at CU Boulder, Seal enjoyed her time as music director for the Eklund Opera Theater Singers, as well as music director for CU NOW's Composer Fellows' Initiative.

Seal has spent summers as a collaborative pianist at Tanglewood Music Center, Music Academy of the West, Brevard Music Center, Castleman Quartet Program, "Si parla, si canta" and the Rocky Mountain Summer Conservatory. As a staff pianist, she has performed with the National Summer Cello Institute, Interlochen Summer Arts Camp, Gesher Music Festival, Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts, Wisconsin Public Radio's Neale-Silva Young Artists' Competition and the Jefferson Symphony's International Young Artists Competition.

Some of Seal's performance highlights include live broadcasts on Wisconsin Public Radio, a recording of *Festive Arias, Volume II* with mezzo soprano Kitt Reuter-Foss and trumpeter David Cooper, and performances with the acclaimed Mark Morris production of Benjamin Britten's *Curlew River*. A varied musician, Seal prepared the keyboard reductions for Handel's *Messiah: The Solo Variants* with critical commentary by Chester Alwes.

Previous studies include a bachelor's degree in piano performance at Stetson University (summa cum laude) in the studio of Michael Rickman, as well as a master;s degree in piano accompanying and chamber music at the Eastman School of Music as a pupil of Jean Barr. Seal also earned a postgraduate collaborative piano fellowship at Bard Conservatory, where she worked closely with the graduate vocal arts program under the direction of Dawn Upshaw and Kayo Iwama. At the University of Colorad Boulder, Seal studied collaborative piano with Margaret McDonald and Alexandra Nguyen.

Seal currently enjoys her roles as piano faculty and staff pianist at Northern Kentucky University. As an active freelance pianist in the Cincinnati area, Seal has performed with various organizations including the Music for All Seasons Series, Cincinnati Opera Outreach and University of Cincinnati-College Conservatory of Music degree recitals.

# **Allan Armstrong**

Pianist and vocal coach Allan Armstrong is assistant professor of music in voice at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, where he specializes in art song literature and opera coaching. He serves as a faculty pianist/coach at the Tel Aviv Summer Opera program. Armstrong is also the official accompanist of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions for both the Colorado/Wyoming District and the Rocky Mountain Region. From 2017 to 2020, he was visiting assistant professor in chamber and collaborative music at the Jacobs School. He was previously a member of the applied piano faculty at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, where he directed the nationally awardwinning Bravo Opera Company. He has taught on the faculty of the Sherrill Milnes Savannah Voice Festival and the International Vocal Arts Institute. In 2005, he coached and recorded the newly revised version of Béla Bartók's Bluebeard's Castle under the direction of the composer's son, Peter Bartók. In 2010, Armstrong was a featured solo pianist in a recital of the complete solo piano works of Pulitzer Prize-winning composer David Del Tredici at New York University Steinhardt. In 2019, he was chosen to participate in the acclaimed National Association of Teachers

of Singing Intern Program at the New England Conservatory. In 2021 Armstrong received the Indiana University Trustees Award, in recognition of outstanding achievements in teaching. Armstrong earned a Doctor of Musical Arts in collaborative piano from the University of Colorado Boulder, where he studied with Alexandra Nguyen and Margaret McDonald.

#### Kaleb Chesnic

Hailed by Gramophone as a "sensitive and virtuoso performer," flutist Kaleb Chesnic delights audiences with his commanding presence, brilliant technique, and thoughtful interpretations. Chesnic is an active solo, chamber and orchestral musician, having performed with The Cleveland Orchestra, Colorado Symphony, Albany Symphony Orchestra and other groups around the USA.

Chesnic is a lecturer in flute at Baldwin Wallace University's Conservatory of Performing Arts. Chesnic received his bachelor's degree from the Baldwin Wallace Conservatory of Music, and his Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Colorado Boulder. His principal teachers have been George Pope, Christina Jennings, Damian Bursill-Hall and Andrei Pidkivka. His other significant influences are Marina Piccinini, Brook Ferguson and Amy Porter.

Chesnic's debut album, *Grieg: Violin Sonatas for Flute*, with pianist Nathália Kato, is available from MSR Classics.

#### Nathália Kato

Since August 2022, pianist Nathália Kato has been based in Pittsburgh, where she is highly sought after for her expertise in collaborative piano. Kato is an djunct professor of voice at Duquesne University, where she serves as vocal coach and music director of Opera Workshop. Prior to this appointment, she served as staff pianist at the University of Wyoming from 2020-2022.

Kato has extensive experience in orchestral, operatic and chamber music activities. Her repertoire list consists of numerous instrumental, chamber

and vocal works, including 25 complete operas. Before moving to the United States, she served as a répétiteur for three seasons at Theatro São Pedro, an opera house in São Paulo in her home country of Brazil. An avid collaborative pianist, Kato has been involved in groundbreaking and thought-provoking projects throughout the years. Alongside her husband violinist Andrew Giordano, they have formed Duo Pragma and often perform rarely-heard repertoire by both well-known and historically marginalized composers. In November 2021, she and flutist Kaleb Chesnic made their debut album together recording Chesnic's own transcriptions for flute and piano of the three violin sonatas of Edvard Grieg, which was released on MSR Classics. Further recent projects include collaborations with the Carnegie Mellon Opera, Mendelssohn Choir of Pittsburgh and Chamber Music Pittsburgh.

Kato received a Doctor of Musical Arts in collaborative piano from the University of Colorado Boulder, studying with Margaret McDonald and Alexandra Nguyen. From 2015 to 2020, she held a teaching assistantship through which she served as a rehearsal and orchestral pianist, harpsichordist and coach for Eklund Opera under the guidance of maestro Nicholas Carthy. Kato has maintained a close professional relationship with CU Boulder College of Music and returns to Boulder every summer since 2019 to be on the artistic team of the CU New Opera Workshop. She has been mainly involved as music director of the Composer Fellows' Initiative (CFI), which provides her with the opportunity to work with distinguished American composers such as Tom Cipullo and Jake Heggie.

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
