



Director's Note

Welcome to the grand opening of the Roe Green Theatre! With this production we express our gratitude to our generous alumnus and friend, Roe Green, and we also welcome back another alumni of our program, Bailey Trierweiler (BFA'18), who is one of the Roe Green Visiting Theatre Artists this year. Trierweiler is joined by Noel Nichols and Daniela Hart, partners of UptownWorks based in NYC, a sound design firm.

Human labor created almost every object we interact with during our day: the bed we sleep in, the fruit we eat for breakfast (okay, the donut), the transportation we ride, the fuel that propels that conveyance, the clothes we wear, the water that comes out of the faucet ... none of these things exist without people's labor. With this production, we want to honor all of the folks—whatever their involvement—who contributed to the renovation of the Roe Green Theatre.

The COVID-19 pandemic revealed many inequalities in our way of life. When it came to defining who were essential workers, nurses and doctors are obvious candidates, but they can't keep a hospital running without housekeeping, pharmacists, lab technicians, pharmacists, cooks, maintenance, and so many more. The pandemic also shed light on the reality that many employees do not have the option of working remotely. During the recession of 1973, Studs Terkel began collecting interviews for his book as workers were feeling increasingly stressed: interest rates and unemployment were both going up. The unemployment rate rose from 3.5% in 1969 to 10.8% by 1982; interest rates spiked in 1981 at 18.63%—they had been 2.25% in 1950.

"This book, being about work, is, by its very nature, about violence—the spirit as well as to the body." In rereading Terkel's *Working* (1974), I was struck by this first sentence of his introduction. During his life, Terkel was called "the Walt Whitman of the radio waves" for the wide range of guests he interviewed on his radio program. As he talked to hundreds more for his book, Terkel not only found plenty of Americans who were "singing" about their work, he found plenty who were moaning, screaming, or just too bone-tired to say much. Unsurprisingly, lower-income workers are more likely to experience poor safety

conditions at work, discrimination and harassment (gender, race, age, gender expression and sexual orientation), inadequate health plans (if any are provided) and no paid time off.

While we were not able to include in this production all the interviews with Colorado citizens who agreed to share their stories with us, we are grateful for their time, and for sharing their hopes and frustrations with us.

The entire company of *Working* and everyone in the Department of Theatre & Dance is grateful to Roe Green for not only making the acoustic "Roe-novation" of the theatre possible, but also for the creation of endowments for the Roe Green Endowed Chair in Theatre professorship, the Roe Green Visiting Theatre Artist program and for student scholarships.

Dramaturg's Note

Working was first introduced to the world in 1978 as a Broadway review. It is a documentary musical. Documentary theatre is theatre that uses preexisting documentary material (such as newspapers, government reports, interviews, journals and correspondences) as source material for stories about real events and people, frequently without altering the text in performance. The Broadway premier of Working only ran for 24 performances; people were not ready for it ... yet. Working was too close to home, unemployment was fluctuating between 6 and 8 percent the whole decade, the Vietnam War had just come to a close (1975) and the Cold War was still ever present. Historians would later call this decade "the worst decade of most industrialized countries" economic performance since the Great Depression. Economic growth rates were considerably lower than previous decades." Entertainment was for escapism and Working wanted people to face their realities.

Working may have not stayed long for its original run but it flourished in local theatres and revivals. This revolutionary musical then reinvented itself again by expanding on the work (pun intended) with the localized version of Working (2019). This version (the version you are about to see) keeps the musical timeless by adding new interviews to the already existing script (see if you

can guess the new ones). The localized version also features additional songs from Lin-Manuel Miranda. *Working* is still as relevant as ever, dare I say more so; post-pandemic unemployment peaked at 14.7 percent, inflation is at an all time high (remember when Girl Scout cookies were \$3.50) and many haven't returned to the workforce, opting for entrepreneurship and/or gig work instead. The pandemic forced people to stop (working) and think about what actually matters in life, it gave people the chance to chase their dreams finally and they took it.

Roe Green

Roe Green, arts patron and community activist, is chief executive officer of the Roe Green Foundation. With a BA in theatre and communications from the University of Colorado Boulder and a MA in theatre from Kent State University, her experience in stage and business management includes Porthouse Theatre, Cain Park, Cleveland Opera and Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park. Today, she is President Emeritus of C.A.V.O.R.T. Inc. (Conference About Volunteers of Regional Theatre), serves on the Foundation board of Kent State University, the Board of the Cleveland Play House (where she is Honorary Producer of New Ground and the board of Maltz Jupiter Theatre in Florida). She also created the Green House, a battered women's shelter in Geauga, Ohio. Green is an avid traveler, having visited over 160 countries and sees theatre whenever she can. Green received the Governor's 2009 Ohio Arts Council's Governor's Arts Patron Award, the 2012 Alumni Recognition Award from CU Boulder, the 2013 Dramatist Guild Fund Award and the Muse Award (2014) from the Cultural Council of Palm Beach.

In 2015, Green received the Kent State University College of the Arts' inaugural Centennial Award for her service and patronage, and the Cleveland Play House Super Nova Award. In 2017, she received the Theatre Forward Leadership Award at the Theatre Forward Chairman's Awards Gala, the 2018 Lifetime Achievement Award, and in 2020 was named a winner of the Cleveland Arts Prize. In 2023, Green received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Kent State University.

Her gifts to CU Boulder have created the Roe Green Visiting Theatre Artist Program and the Roe Green Endowed Chair in Theatre. We all thank Roe Green (BA Theatre '70) for her munificent support of our department.
