

About the Choreographer

Program Notes

This work explores the duality of performance—how the stage can feel like a sanctuary while life can demand constant performance. Through movement, the work investigates introspection, empathy and the personal relationship Shepardson has with performance. The work confronts the fragile boundary between authenticity and the roles we're forced to play. Here, the line between truth and pretense blurs, laying bare the raw discomfort of inhabiting a world that expects you to perform even when the act is your own.
