Drumming is fun and it's not hard. Everybody can drum and everybody can have fun!

Gota Traditional Drumming

Gota is a style of drumming that came from Benin and Ghana, and is played by the Ewe people.

Kpanlogo Traditional Dance

The Kpanlogo dance was invented by Otoo Lincoln. He was told the following Ansee folk story by his grandfather: Kpanlogo, Mma Mma and Algodzan were the names of three triplet girls. Their father was the chief and said whoever could guess their names could marry them. A man went to their home pretending to be a mad man asking for water, met the girls, and learned their names as they called to each other. To remember them he kept singing to himself 'Kp. Mma. Al,' and of course he married the girls. Soon after Ghana became an independent nation in 1957. Kpanlogo came to symbolize the youth independence of a young nation and was played at funerals, state occasions, and became an anthem for the ruling party at the time. It remains popular today.

Highlife and CU Boulder West African Highlife Ensemble

Highlife is a form of popular music from West Africa, widely heard especially in Ghana and Nigeria. The development of highlife is the result of interactions with European culture, urbanization, and the formation of new social identities. Hence, highlife draws first from the indigenous dance music and topical song forms among the various ethnic groups in the countries (including the Akan, Ewe, Igbo, and Yoruba peoples), late 19th century sounds of the British Regimental Band music on the West African coasts and 20th century palm wine guitar music. For urbanized Africans who may be working far away from home, highlife continues from where traditional music left off. Highlife is performed in the cafes, nightclubs, ballrooms, concert halls and other venues of entertainment.

The CU West African Highlife Ensemble was formed in the fall of 2000 when Kwasi Ampene joined the College of Music faculty. It is the only student Highlife ensemble in the United States, functioning as a key component of the College of Music's venture into the intriguing world of ethnomusicology. The Highlife Ensemble offers a unique opportunity, not only to explore, but to create music entirely new to American students. Our repertoire goes beyond Highlife to include traditional, neo-traditional, and Afro-Pop genres of countries from West Africa to South Africa.
