Personnel

Emilie Bertram is a doctoral candidate in choral conducting and Literature at the University of Colorado Boulder, currently acting as conductor of the Women's Chorus, assistant conductor of University Singers and assistant chorus master for the Verdi Requiem performance. Prior to beginning doctoral studies, Bertram taught in Minnesota, New York, and California for 10 years. While in California, Bertram's choirs were invited to perform in San Francisco, Anaheim, Seattle, Vancouver, Ireland and New York City, and were featured at the 2017 California ACDA State Convention. In November 2019. Bertram presented research at the National Collegiate Choral Organization and will present a session on rehearsal pedagogy techniques at the upcoming March 2020 California Music Educators Association Convention. Bertram holds a BM degree in secondary vocal music education and piano from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota and a MM degree from Ithaca College School of Music in Ithaca, New York.

Raul Dominguez recently received his Master of Music degree from Ithaca College (IC) where he studied conducting with Janet Galván. While there, he worked extensively with all major choral ensembles and conducted the Intergenerational Choir (comprised of retirement center residents and IC music students). He presented his research on Mexican choral music at his graduate recital and at the IC Whalen Symposium, where it was recognized with a session award. Prior to IC, Dominguez was the choir director of Clear Lake High School in Houston, where his students performed alongside the Houston Symphony and Chorus and the Houston Chamber Choir, and gave a Carnegie Hall performance in 2017. He holds Bachelor of Music degrees in vocal performance and music education from Oklahoma City University. Now based in Colorado, he is thrilled to serve as the one of Men's Chorus's conductors and as the assistant artistic director of the Denver Gay Men's Chorus while earning his Doctor of Musical Arts in choral conducting and literature at CU Boulder!

Aaron Harp is in his third year of doctoral studies at the University of Colorado Boulder and serves as the vocal director of the Early Music Ensemble and assistant conductor of University Singers. Prior to beginning his degree, he taught high school and middle school choir in Texas for five years. He holds a Master of Music degree from the University of North Texas in vocal performance and conducting and a Bachelor of Music degree from Ouachita Baptist University in vocal performance. This past November, Harp presented research on Schubert's final two masses at the National Collegiate Choral Organization Conference. Harp is in frequent demand as a soloist and chorister and specializes in the music of the Baroque period. He has performed with many noted ensembles, including Santa Fe Desert Chorale, Colorado Bach Ensemble, Bach Society Houston, Dallas Bach Society and Orpheus Chamber Singers.

Clare Malinowski is a second year master's student studying music education at the University of Colorado Boulder. After receiving her undergraduate degree from the University of Wisconsin La Crosse, Malinowski worked for six years as a choral and general music teacher in Wisconsin. Recently, Malinowski was named a conducting fellow for the Wisconsin Conducting Symposium with professional chamber choir Madison Choral Project and their artistic director Albert Pinsonneault. Currently, Malinowski is the assistant conductor for ASTER Women's Chamber Choir and is the co-conductor to the University of Colorado Boulder's Men's Chorus.

Logan Moore is in his second year of his Master's Degree in vocal performance with an emphasis in choral conducting at the University of Colorado Boulder. Most recently, Moore was the recipient of the L. Cunningham Scholarship, the Warner Imig Scholarship, the Dale Johnson Scholarship and the David O'Hagan Music Scholar award. He has been a featured soloist in venues such as Carnegie Hall, the Ryman Auditorium and St. Peter's Basilica. Most recently, Moore has toured with ACDA's Executive Director Tim Sharp as a featured

soloist for his Bluegrass Mass in Kaili City, China, and at the IFCM conference in Shenzhen, China. He is an active member of NAfME, ACDA, CMEA and NATS.

Daniel Parks is a doctoral student in choral conducting and literature at the University of Colorado Boulder where he conducts the Collegiate Chorale and Madrigal Singers. He also serves as associate artistic director of the Longmont Chorale. As a music educator, Parks taught choral music at the middle and high schools levels in Wisconsin. As a professional ensemble singer, he has performed with Alium Spiritum, Solis Singers, Boulder Chorale, Minnesota Chorale, Border CrosSing and Weimar Bach Cantata Academy. He completed a master's degree in choral conducting at the University of Minnesota Twin Cities and a Bachelor of Music degree in music education at Lawrence University. His research interests include vocal improvisation. comprehensive musicianship through performance (CMP) and early music.

Gregory Gentry is director of choral studies and Lynn Whitten Choral Faculty Fellow at the CU Boulder College of Music, where he administers the doctoral, masters and undergraduate choral conducting programs. With 20 plus years as a college educator, Gentry's choirs have performed for conferences of the American Choral Directors Association, National Collegiate Choral Organization, Music Educators National Conference, Society for American Music and College Music Society. He recently conducted the world premiere of Reflections on a Mexican Garden at Carnegie Hall, as well as Duruflé's Requiem at historic Macky Auditorium. At Arizona State University, Gentry presented combined symphonic and choral forces in William Walton's Belshazzar's Feast and Tito's Say by Arizona composer James DeMars (a premiere honored by the Mexican Consulate) at Gammage Auditorium. His Phoenix Symphony conducting debut in 2009 was to sold-out audiences with Stravinsky's Symphony of Psalms, along with engagements in New York, London and Rome. As chorus

master with the Phoenix Symphony (2005-2012), Gentry prepared many major choral/orchestral masterworks, including Puccini's Messa di Gloria (2012). North American premiere of *In Principio* by Arvo Pärt (2011), On the Transmigration of Souls and Nixon in China (2009) by John Adams, and the world premiere of Enemy Slayer: A Navajo Oratorio (2008). The Gregory Gentry Choral Series, distributed by Hal Leonard, features revived choral octavi from Golden and National Music Publishers catalogues. Gentry (DMA, MM University of Missouri-Kansas City; BME University of Denver) is former director of choral performance at Arizona State University, and director of choral activities at University of Alabama. As past president of Arizona chapter American Choral Directors Association, Gentry also founded Southwest Liederkranz in 2006, an intimate symposium for select choral professionals, where Kirke Mechem. Morten Lauridsen, Jaakko Mäntyjärvi, Vance George, Dale Warland and Maria Guinand have shared wisdom and varying inspirations.

Leila Heil is associate professor of music education at the University of Colorado Boulder. She currently teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in choral music and music education. Her professional experience includes 21 years of public school teaching at the secondary level in Kansas, Arizona and Colorado. From 1990-2013, she served as assistant conductor of the Grammy Jazz Choir and on the faculty of Grammy Camp Jazz Session. Heil has conducted honor choirs in Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming and Texas, and her professional singing experience includes the St. Martin's Chamber Choir, the Colorado Bach Ensemble and the Phoenix Bach Choir (renamed the Phoenix Chorale). Heil has authored and co-authored articles on improvisation, vocal jazz, teacher identity and pre-service teacher preparation in the Music Educators Journal, Choral Journal, Visions in Music Education Research and Contributions to Music Education. She has presented sessions at numerous international and national conferences including the Midwest Clinic, the Society for Music Teacher Education (SMTE) Conference, the National Association for

Music Education (NAfME) Research and Teacher Education Conference, the NAfME National In-service Conference, the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) National Conference. the National Early Music Association (NEMA) Conference, the Research in Music Education Conference (RIME), and the International Jazz Educators Association (IAJE) Conference. She has also presented at state NAfME and ACDA conferences in Colorado, Arizona, Ohio and Texas.

Elizabeth Swanson is the associate director of choral studies at the University of Colorado Boulder. She is honored to serve as the conductor of the University Choir, which was founded in 1938 by Warner Imig. A passionate educator, Swanson also teaches courses in conducting at the undergraduate level and applied lessons in conducting at the graduate level, and serves on master's and doctoral committees. Swanson maintains an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator throughout the United States. This year, she was the conductor for the inaugural Montana State University Women's Vocal Festival in Bozeman. Montana and a conductor-in-residency at Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. Additionally, Swanson serves on the executive board of the National Collegiate Choral Organization as

Vice President. Prior to her appointment at CU Boulder, Swanson lived in New York City and was the director of choirs at Nyack College School of Music in lower Manhattan. Under her direction, the Nyack College Chorale performed in renowned venues such as David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center, the Cathedral of St. John the Divine and St. Paul's Chapel at Trinity Church Wall Street, and toured domestically. Swanson has also been a member of the conducting faculty at The University of Chicago, North Park University, Roosevelt University and Ithaca College. She earned degrees from Northwestern University (DM conducting), Ithaca College (MM conducting) and St. Olaf College (BM vocal education).

Natalie Werner is in the first year of graduate studies at the University of Colorado Boulder where she is pursuing a Master of Music degree in choral conducting and voice performance. She currently serves as the assistant conductor of both the Women's Chorus and University Choir. Werner recently received a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Portland in vocal performance and music education, where she held a conducting associate position for three semesters and won the 2018 University of Portland Concerto/Aria competition.
