Program notes

Jesús Valdés Rodríguez, better known as Chucho Valdés (born Oct. 9, 1941), is a Cuban pianist, bandleader, composer and arranger whose career spans more than 50 years. An original member of the Orquesta Cubana de Música Moderna, in 1973 he founded the group Irakere, one of Cuba's best-known Latin jazz bands. Both his father, Bebo Valdés, and his son, Chuchito, are also pianists. He has won six Grammy Awards and three Latin Grammy Awards.

Egberto Amin Gismonti (born Dec. 5, 1947 in Carmo, Rio de Janeiro) is a Brazilian composer, guitarist and pianist with a career spanning five decades. The major phases are distinguished by record company, the ensemble format and the musical collaborators. The most important ensembles are his Brazilian group Academia de Danças, including Mauro Senise (saxophone and flutes), Zeca Assumpção (bass) and Nenê (Realcino Lima Filho, drums and percussion), the duo with Naná Vasconcelos (percussion) and the trio with Charlie Haden (bass) and Jan Garbarek (saxophone). Danca das Cabecas, the first ECM record, was nominated Album of the Year by Stereo Review and received the 1977 Großer Deutscher Schallplattenpreis.

Eddie Palmieri (born Dec. 15, 1936) is a Grammy Award-winning pianist, bandleader, musician and composer of Puerto Rican ancestry. He is the founder of the bands La Perfecta, La Perfecta II and Harlem River Drive. Palmieri's parents moved to New York from Ponce, Puerto Rico, in 1926, and settled in the South Bronx, a largely Hispanic neighborhood. There, he and his elder brother, Charlie, were born. He accompanied Charlie and participated in many talent contests when he was eight years old. Palmieri continued his education in the city's public school system where he was constantly exposed to music, specifically jazz. He took piano lessons and performed at Carnegie Hall when he was 11 years old. His main influences were Thelonious Monk and McCoy Tyner. Inspired by his older brother, he was determined to someday form his own band—something he achieved in 1950, when he was fourteen years old. During the 1950s, Palmieri played in various bands, including Tito Rodríguez's.

Mestas has performed with renowned bands, including Guaco and Trabuco Venezolano, and he has also accompanied world renowned singers, including: Soledad Bravo, Cheo Feliciano, and Julio Iglesias. Since moving to Boulder, he's been performing on the Brazilian-Latin Jazz scene, as well as directing the Latin Jazz Ensemble at Thompson Jazz Studies Program, CU Boulder.

José Alberto Cabrera, vocalist from Caracas, Venezuela, started singing at the early age of 9 during middle school time. When reached 15 started to listen salsa for the first time and got hooked up with all the salsa movement of those years back in 1978. Has been the lead singer for several salsa bands in Denver as well as in an area of Orlando Florida.
