# About the College of Music

Since 1920, the College of Music offers a wide range of programs for undergraduate and graduate study, integrating advanced musical training with professionally oriented experiences and the rich resources of a leading research university. Award-winning performers, scholars and composers, college faculty are deeply dedicated pedagogues helping students develop and succeed in their musical endeavors—whether your passion is to teach, perform, compose, research or rethink music entirely. The college offers seven undergraduate and graduate degrees in 24 fields of study, along with an array of interdisciplinary opportunities, including certificates in music technology and entrepreneurship. ### **Entrepreneurship Center for Music (ECM)**

The ECM is a national leader in professional development for musicians, equipping today's music students with the skills and tools they need to create sustainable careers in the arts. As one of the first such programs in the country, the ECM is an entrepreneurial endeavor, developing new paradigms for education, leadership and advocacy in the emerging field of arts entrepreneurship.

#### Musicians' Wellness Program (MWP)

The MWP increases proficiency and prevents injury through somatic training, health-related information and a medical support network. As such, the MWP provides essential assistance to injured students with the goals of returning them to full function and preventing further injury, and guiding them to resources and local medical professionals trained in the special

needs of musicians. Classes and lessons in the Alexander Technique and Body Mapping are offered each semester.

### American Music Research Center (AMRC)

The AMRC is dedicated to exploring and celebrating the diverse and rich traditions of American music. Jointly housed between the College of Music and University Libraries, the AMRC is home to a rare music repository that includes scores, papers, recordings, and material artifacts that document the history of American music and the people who have made it. The AMRC further sponsors public events and outreach activities—concerts, conferences, publications and lectures, all based on AMRC collections—and provides research grants to support institutionally-affiliated and independent scholars.
