#### Director's Note

The characters and dynamics in A Doll House have intriqued me throughout my career so I am grateful to Roe Green and the talented faculty, staff and students at the University of Colorado to have the opportunity to adapt and direct it. Working on the adaptation, I read many versions of the play and came to agree with scholar Rolf Fielde who said, "Ibsen titled his play Et dukkehiem -A Doll House, without the possessive 's... it is the entire house which is on trial, the total complex of relationships, including husband, wife, children, servants, upstairs and downstairs, that is tested by the visitors that come and go, embodying aspects of the inescapable reality outside. No character is superfluous in the design, nor negligible in performance." This play was set in Norway in 1879 and is very much rooted to that time and place. Or is it? Women then had little freedom and were expected to fulfill conscribed roles in their home and society. As Americans in 2017, women enjoy equality under the law, and vet we continue to struggle to become fully realized human beings making our own decisions about who we are and what we hope to become as individuals, in families and as a society. It is my sincere wish that this production will further our conversation.

## Dramaturg's Note

When a lie is exposed, how do we continue to live the life we once led? Ibsen often asked his audience to consider this question. Ibsen's "life-lie," as it is known, presents the characters and audience with a choice: go back to life before the lie was exposed or leave the lie behind. For Nora, the choice she faces and ultimately makes after the "life-lie" is exposed feels inevitable to our modern sensibilities. However, when it premiered in 1879, her decision was almost unheard of. How could she? Yet, as one critic noted, "Is there anyone who does not feel that it is this delightful young woman's duty, her inescapable duty, to leave this gentleman, this husband, who slowly sacrifices her on the altar of his egotism, and who fails to understand her value as a human being."
